## EDUCATION & PSYCHOLOGY

### MOTIVATION & CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT

#### **EDUC 711C** Effective Character Education

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Why does character matter and why are manners important? This course delineates the stages of character development and the acquisitions of moral understanding throughout childhood and adolescence.

#### **EDUC 713J** Motivating Students Who Don't Care

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Awaken students to the excitement of learning! This course examines different types of motivation such as intrinsic motivation, and activating the metacognitive and cognitive systems. It gives the educator models for developing motivation in the classroom.

#### **EDUC 713O** Building Classroom Discipline

Discipline problems can be major sources of frustration and burnout for educators and students alike. This course provides positive effective strategies and practical solutions to help manage and address discipline problems.

## EDUCATIONAL TOOLS FOR TEACHERS

### **EDUC 710Z** Behavior Modification for Yourself and Others

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Whether starting an exercise program, improving self-confidence, changing a diet, or improving relationships with others, this course discusses multiple strategies proven effective for changing one's behavior. The focus for learning will be the analysis and implementation of a behavior modification program over a period of four weeks.

### **EDUC 711X** Creating a Mindful Environment

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

The mindful individual experiences the world by creating new categories, being open to new information, and being aware that any experience can be viewed from more than one perspective. This course covers the concept of mindfulness in the context of many real-life situations and in the context of academic instruction.

### **EDUC 712I** Learning the Meanings of Words

**2 Semester Credits** **\$280.00**

This research-based course explores current theories of word learning, providing a basic understanding of how children use cognitive abilities such as inference, concept acquisition, syntactic structure, general learning, and memory abilities to learn new words.

### **EDUC 712X** Understanding and Dealing with Difficult Parents

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Dealing with difficult parents is one of the biggest problems faced by today's educators and administrators. This course provides educators with creative strategies to handle problems diplomatically and defuse angry or emotionally charged parents.

### **EDUC 714A** Personal Motivation & Maintaining a Positive Attitude in the Classroom

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

To motivate students and be effective in the classroom, the educator must be excited about teaching. This course elaborates on the concept that attitudes are contagious, and the most effective teachers are those who demonstrate enthusiasm for their subjects and professions.

### **EDUC 714E** What's in a Grade?

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course addresses the objectives of grading and reporting on student learning and motivation, the rationale for separating nonacademic factors from the letter grade, the fairness of offering students more than one chance, and the profound effect of zeros when averaging a grade.



**EDUC 714M** Creating a Meaningful Classroom Assessment Program**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Guided by the latest research and proven methods, educators will develop the skills necessary to implement a successful student-centered formative assessment process across all grade levels. K-12 educators will learn how to map out learning progressions, select assessment strategies to provide quality feedback, engage students in self-assessment and self-management, remain mindful of individual social and emotional learning needs, and much more.

**EDUC 714S** Becoming a More Effective Teacher**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

This course is designed for the beginning teacher, the teacher changing grade levels, or for the returning teacher who may want to refine his or her classroom organization and management.

**EDUC 714Z** Self-Directed Learning: Making Learning Meaningful for Adolescent Students**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

The possibilities for student motivation, achievement, and success are enhanced when educators move to a self-directed learning environment. This course will help educators motivate and empower students to take responsibility for their learning by assisting them in goal setting, self-monitoring, reflection, and independent coursework.

**EDUC 715B** Making Connections for Engaged Learning**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

When educators make connections with their students, there will be greater cooperation on the part of the student and increased engagement in learning. Educators will learn how to set up learning teams to make the classroom more satisfying, with the ultimate goal of engaging everyone in learning.

**EDUC 715I** Effective Feedback to Improve Student Achievement**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

It's not about grades, it's about learning! When educators provide effective feedback, they become learning coaches for students. Numerous examples are provided to emphasize feedback to improve achievement for successful, struggling, and reluctant students.

**EDUC 716D** 21st Century Skills: Preparing Students for a Successful Future**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course will help educators integrate vital skills into the everyday classroom. Educators will learn about lesson planning that involves project-based and interactive learning experiences that will help their students meet the demands of the 21st century.

**EDUC 716F** RTI and RTI<sup>2</sup>: Revitalizing K-12**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

These education strategies are revolutionizing schools by helping students succeed, academically and behaviorally, in ways that no legislation has ever done. This course offers accurate and accessible reference tools, giving educators the strategies they need to provide students with high-quality instruction and effective interventions.

**EDUC 717I** The Flipped Classroom**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

In this course, you will learn the difference between traditional and flipped-mastery learning, why the flipped classroom works, what strategies are effective for flipping your classroom, how to design a flipped classroom lesson plan, and what you need to flip your own classroom.

**EDUC 717S** Making Math Meaningful, Maybe Marvelous!**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course introduces well-researched suggestions for optimizing instruction at all levels, including implications for how students can learn math and how teachers can facilitate learning math. While remaining cognizant of the time and choice constraints placed on teachers by Common Core, anticipated problems and ways to overcome them are addressed through understanding of different learning strengths and skill levels.

**EDUC 717T** Personalized Learning: A Powerful Solution to an Urgent Need for Change**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Personalized learning is a student-driven model that doesn't require educators to start from scratch. Instead, teaching and learning become more exciting through the connection of academic goals of current curriculum with learning that relates to the lives, interests and needs of learners.



**EDUC 718C** Understanding and Teaching the Rewired Brain**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Frequent use of technology may alter intelligence, attention span, self-esteem, memory, critical thinking processes, empathy, and social relationship by rewiring our brains. By examining and learning how technology is changing the way students' brains function, educators can adapt to keep students motivated to learn.

**EDUC 718M** Critical Thinking: How to Win the War Against Fake News**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course is designed to help you teach your students to approach all the information they receive with a critical attitude, asking, for example: What's the source? What do I know about the author? How does this information square with other sources? Is it reasonable? Should I check Snopes? Resources are available for all levels. All are engaging, and some are even amusing. All have the underlying severe intent of teaching us how to be careful judges of what we read.

**EDUC 718S** Mindful Teachers, Mindful Students**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

This course offers educators many opportunities to learn and teach mindfulness techniques to their students. For teachers and students alike, mindfulness practices set the tone for the day, ease transitions from subject to subject, and provide a safe and predictable pattern that helps students concentrate. Mindfulness practices that might be adopted schoolwide are also explored.

**EDUC 718V** Practical Strategies for Teaching Online**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

In this timely course, you will receive essential hands-on tools and evidence-based strategies to equip you to deliver an effective distance learning environment for your students. You will also develop positive teacher-student relationships, build credibility with your students and parents, prepare assessments, and meet your learning targets. Additional topics include instructional approaches through synchronous and asynchronous learning, discussion of equity challenges related to distance learning, how to reduce busywork, prioritize curriculum that engages students, and much more!

**EDUC 719L** Project Based Learning**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course explores the benefits and challenges of implementing Project Based Learning (PBL) in the classroom. Students are introduced to the foundational ideas and practices needed to create a PBL culture in their classrooms. Additionally, students will be provided with a template for designing, implementing and assessing their own PBL learning activities.





## **EDUC 719N** Genius Hour: Implementing Passion-Based Learning

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Genius Hour for “passion-based” learning will teach you about a fresh and exciting teaching method to reinvigorate both you and your students. After implementing what you learn from this course, your students will experience personalized learning through self-driven projects, the application of standards and real-world skills, and opportunities to learn through productive struggle and reflection!

## **EDUC 719R** Teaching STEM in the Early Years

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course provides an introduction to the principles and practices of teaching STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) in the primary education settings. It is designed for educators, caregivers, and anyone interested in fostering young children’s curiosity, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills through engaging STEM experiences.

## **EDUC 719X** Implementing Playful Learning in PreK-2 Classroom

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

In this course, participants will focus on the benefits of independent play in the PreK-2 classroom, and how it can enhance student learning. Teachers will learn multiple ways to transform learning environments to incorporate play, create learning opportunities that speak to various student identities, design playful learning experiences that promote critical thinking, and respond to observations and assessments to draw on children’s capabilities.

## NEURODIVERSITY AND LEARNING DISORDERS

### **EDUC 711H** Teaching Gifted and Talented Students

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

What is giftedness? What can educators do with underachievers and perfectionists? This course covers educational implications of giftedness and provides classroom strategies and techniques for engaging gifted students.

### **EDUC 711I** Teaching Gifted and Talented Girls

**1 Semester Credit** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$140.00**

This course focuses on the unique problems and joys of talented girls and offers practical ideas for educators and counselors.

### **EDUC 712U** Child Behavior Disorders

**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

Behaviorally disordered, emotionally disturbed, or socially maladjusted are terms often used to describe children who are troubled or who cause trouble for those around them. In addition to explanations of behavior and conduct disorders, this course gives an in-depth view of conditions that affect learning and academic performance.

### **EDUC 712Y** ABCs of Effective Mainstreaming & Inclusion

**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

Educators will be better prepared to handle the most frustrating aspects of teaching a child with a learning difference, more prepared to maximize each student's strengths, and better equipped to meet the multitude of challenges that accompany mainstreaming and inclusion.

### **EDUC 712Z** Understanding Autism

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course discusses the exciting developments in research, education, and treatments that have emerged in recent years. Topics covered include the history of autism, special education policy, the neurological basis of autism, and autism throughout the life cycle.

**EDUC 713C** Psychology of Exceptional Children**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course is designed to familiarize educators about the special problems of children who have health, academic, emotional, behavioral, sensory, and physical exceptionalities. It provides information on diagnoses, observable traits, and instructional strategies to support each learner.

**EDUC 713K** The Differentiated Classroom**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Dividing time and resources to effectively instruct students of diverse backgrounds, readiness levels, skill levels, and ways of learning is one of the most difficult challenges faced by educators. By focusing on research, theory and examples, this course will help in meeting these challenges.

**EDUC 714U** Understanding Asperger's Syndrome**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Children and adolescents with Asperger's Syndrome (AS) can intrigue and confound educators – often simultaneously. This course will help explain AS, and why individuals with AS act the way they do, will provide tools to encourage more appropriate behavior, and include intervention strategies to enhance learning and communication.

**EDUC 715A** Teaching Students with Mild Disabilities**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course is designed to help educators identify characteristics of students with mild disabilities and to introduce educators to practices that influence the identification, placement, and teaching of these students. It also provides educators with specific strategies and knowledge of materials, which are important in meeting the needs of students with mild disabilities in a variety of classroom settings.

**EDUC 715G** ADD/ADHD Strategies and Interventions for the Classroom**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course defines the symptoms and characteristics of ADD/ADHD, offers strategies to use within the classroom and with parents, and discusses the role of temperament traits in the behavior of children with ADD/ADHD.

**EDUC 717Z** Special Education Law**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

Through easy-to-comprehend texts, educators will learn how to understand student disabilities, the pre-referral, referral and evaluation process, differences and similarities of IEP and Section 504 plans, roles of education professionals, detailed laws and court case examples, and many more related topics.

**EDUC 717M** Understanding Dyslexia**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Dyslexia is the most common learning disability and is often both undiagnosed and untreated. This course provides the knowledge, skills and tools educators need to effectively understand, assess, and treat individuals struggling with dyslexia and other reading and language-based disabilities.



**EDUC 718B** The Special Needs Brain: Helping it Learn**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Through this course, educators will learn possible causes of special needs, about brain systems that have gone awry, diagnostic issues and criteria, research on practical approaches to helping special needs students learn, and a variety of strategies to consider when planning lessons.

**PSYCHOLOGY****EDUC 710B** I'm So Stressed I Could Scream!**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Physiological causes of stress and various approaches to stress reduction are explored in this course. In addition to learning stress management and relaxation techniques, students will learn to recognize events that trigger stress and to identify stress responses. Students will also create and implement a personal stress reduction program, which will increase awareness and response to everyday stress.

**EDUC 710H** Understanding Your Moods**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

Depression, anxiety, tension, weight control, exercise, and good and bad moods are explored in this course. Students will create a mood log, and learn how diet, exercise, sleep, smoking, caffeine, alcohol, candy, and shopping relate to moods.

**EDUC 711T** Learning Differences Between the Sexes**2 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$280.00**

This research-based course provides examples and techniques from an expert in child and adolescent development to enhance your approach to teaching the two sexes to help them reach their full potential. Topics include gender differences, risks, school, social media, video games, gender nonconforming, and various other topics.

**EDUC 711Y** Adolescent Psychology**3 Semester Credits** ONLINE FORMAT ONLY **\$420.00**

This course examines human development during the period of life known as adolescence. Often thought of as a time of "storm and stress," adolescents are faced with psychological and physical changes, personal challenges, and developmental opportunities. This course explores cognitive, affective, moral, and adolescent personality development from a multicultural and ecological perspective.



**EDUC 712B** Eating Disorders: A Psychological Battlefield**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

Food and eating have become a psychological battleground for many adolescents, especially young women. While several eating disorders are covered, this course concentrates on the history, causes and treatments for anorexia nervosa and bulimia nervosa.

**EDUC 714Q** Student Learning and the Brain**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

Drawing on neuropsychological research and educational experience, this course builds the bridge from brain function to classroom learning. It provides brain compatible teaching strategies, shows why meaning is essential for learning, and it explains how the brain encodes, manipulates, and stores information.

**EDUC 715U** The Universe Revolves Around ME!

Narcissism Inside and Outside the Classroom

**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

The human potential movement has led to a me-first attitude and a strong disregard for the feelings and rights of others. The development, symptoms, and possible treatment of narcissism are covered in the course.

**EDUC 717A** Dying, Death & Bereavement: End of Life Issues**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

This course addresses the paradoxical relationship with our own death and the deaths of others by providing an understanding of issues related to the end of life, death at different age levels, the process of dying, suicide, animals and death, death rituals and funerals, and bereavement.

**EDUC 717L** The Family Defined and Explored**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

This course explores important aspects of family and family relations and discusses how changes in society are changing the nature of family life and communications within and outside the family. It identifies current concerns and problems within the family and presents alternative views of family processes.

**EDUC 717W** How the Brain Learns to Read: Decoding, Comprehension, and Motivation**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

Reading is THE essential academic skill. Yet, in every literate culture, it is a difficult skill to acquire. This course integrates research on the teaching of reading from brain science, psychology, education, linguistics, and other fields and suggests best practices from very early childhood through high school. Reading problems, ranging from social and cultural through biological and psychological, are described and followed with ways of overcoming these obstacles.

**EDUC 718D** Cognitive Approaches to Learning and Teaching**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

This course presents research and practical approaches to learning and teaching through texts based on decades of research in cognitive psychology. Traditional study habits—underline, review, memorize, cram—are ineffective and waste time. Better are questioning, self-quizzing, spaced retrieval, and avoiding traps that lead to false confidence.

**EDUC 718H** Current Topics in Sociology and Society**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

Through the study of current articles on sociological research, students will learn how social influences govern how they function within society. Topics include, but are not limited to, culture, politics, education, economics, gender and societal inequalities, social changes, and the future of our society.

**EDUC 718N** Coaching a Growth Mindset: Unleashing Student Potential**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

## **EDUC 713S** Woolf and Winterson: Rewriting Gender, History and Love

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course examines Virginia Woolf's novel, *Orlando* (1928) and Jeanette Winterson's novel, *Written on the Body* (1992) in terms of their depictions of gender, romantic love, history, and death. The course explores each novel's overturning of gender stereotypes and complex position on whether gender differences are innate.

## **EDUC 714F** Teaching Shakespeare to Children and Young Adults

# HISTORY

## HISTORY

### **EDUC 710M** Women, Spies and Soldiers of the Confederacy

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

From challenges faced by women in the South, to dangerous escapades of Confederate spies, and personal accounts of one soldier's life during the bloodiest four years in American history, this course brings awareness to the effect of this war on history.

### **EDUC 710N** U.S. Constitution

**2 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$280.00**

This course is designed to help convey a sense of the meaning of the Constitution and help educators gain a greater understanding of the spirit of the document.

### **EDUC 711O** Lewis and Clark Expedition

This course journeys through one of the earliest civilizations created by mankind. From pre-dynastic times, to the Ptolemaic and Roman eras, this course explores all aspects of life in ancient Egypt.

**EDUC 713Q** Founding Fathers Create a Unique Nation**2 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$280.00**

This course provides a structured opportunity to struggle with issues challenging both scholars and concerned citizens of the United States during the decade following 1790. This course will discuss the following questions, and more. What were the underlying themes and debates of the founders? How much influence did individual citizens, interest groups, and politicians have on political outcomes? Who participated and why?

**EDUC 713U** Native Peoples of North America**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

This survey of North American Indigenous Peoples takes a regional or "cultural area" approach to Native American Studies based upon history, geography, anthropology, biography, ethnographic case study, and art.

**EDUC 715D** Colonial Spirit and the Settling of North America**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

This course traces the history of the settling of North America, beginning as early as 13,000 B.C., with primary focus on the years 1492 to 1820 A.D. This course focuses on the various North American colonies and their European empires that greatly impacted and influenced our American culture and history.

**EDUC 715F** Visionary Leaders in Action: The Constitutional Convention**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

This course vividly traces the Philadelphia Convention of 1787. This historical journey captures every stormy and dramatic moment of the formation of our most enduring political documents. This course helps students understand the sacrifice, compromise, and courage of our founding fathers.



## **EDUC 715J** Extraordinary and Enterprising Females of the American Revolution

**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

Revisit the American Revolution, a home-front war that brought scarcity, bloodshed, sacrifice, and danger to the lives of every American. This course spotlights the vital role that women and girls played in the struggle for independence.

## **EDUC 715L** Modern China: Clash of Culture and Controversy

## EDUC 716C Middle Ages: Shedding Light on the Dark Ages

Modern art, especially abstraction, challenges the viewer for comprehension. Over 70 modern artists are discussed, and guidance for understanding and evaluating their art is presented. Students will learn about abstraction, avant-garde, expressionism, impressionism, minimalism, Fauvism, cubism, pop, and more with this tour through the creative and often controversial art that challenges one to appreciate different perspectives of art and reality.

### **EDUC 710P** Land Where the Blues Began

**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

In the early 1900s, on the banks of the Mississippi Delta, a new form of music was born, the Delta Blues. This course traces the history of the Delta and its famous blues musicians.

### **EDUC 714L** Beethoven: His Life and Music

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course presents basic and detailed information interweaving Beethoven's music and his life through the use of biographical and art historical materials, portions of musical scores, artwork depicting Beethoven, and influential people in his life.

### **EDUC 715M** The Music and Life of Mozart

**3 Semester Credits** **\$420.00**

This course is designed to highlight the life, the music, and the time period of one of the world's greatest composers: Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. The short life of this creative prodigy is explored as well as the significance of his legacy in the world of music today.

### **EDUC 712K** Rembrandt: The Dutch Master

**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

In this “journey to the past” with the great Dutch artist of the mid-1600s, the world of visual expression and emotion is explored. Through the use of biographical and art historical textual materials and reproductions of paintings in color and etchings in black-and-white, this course presents basic information on Rembrandt.

### **EDUC 712L** Picasso: Creator of Modern Art

**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

The creative genius of Pablo Picasso is explored with emphasis on the influences that led to the development of Modern Art in the 20th Century. This course presents basic and detailed information on Picasso through a study of biographical and historical textual materials, reproductions of paintings, sculptures, drawings, and other art forms.

### **EDUC 712Q** Frida Kahlo: Pain and Passion

**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

This course captures the essence of the soul and spirit of one of Mexico’s greatest painters. Students will learn about “Frida” – the rebel, the sensitive child, the woman of intense emotions, and the gifted artist – who sought refuge from loneliness in her heart and imagination.

### **EDUC 712T** Vincent Van Gogh: The Colors of Life

**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

This course presents material about the life and work of Vincent van Gogh (1853-1890), a contender for the title of the most widely known European artist. Emphasis is placed on the importance of Vincent van Gogh’s work in the progression of great world art and its value to us today as a statement of the indomitable human spirit.

### **EDUC 713X** Teaching Art to Children

**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

Whether you’re wondering for the first time what art concepts your students should experience or you are a teacher with years of practice looking for new ideas, you will find this course inspiring and comprehensive!



### **EDUC 714J** Art and Life of Georgia O'Keeffe

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course is designed to take students on a journey through the life and work of contemporary artist Georgia O'Keeffe (1887 – 1986), from her birth to death, and on to her legacy of today.

### **EDUC 714K** Drawing to Enhance Learning

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

This course is designed to teach the skill of drawing so that students can enjoy drawing successfully, enhance lessons with drawings, or teach others to draw. This course focuses on the five skills necessary to draw successfully. Basic drawing supplies required.

As dwindling budgets and other concerns have caused arts instruction to have been denuded from the school curriculum, it has been established that incorporating the arts into the educational experience and curriculum leads to increased learning and engagement. This course will provide tools for teachers and academicians to help integrate arts back into the classroom.

## SCIENCES

### **EDUC 710R** Hunting Dinosaurs

**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL **\$420.00**

Students will gain insightful and applicable information about the history and discoveries made about dinosaurs. The textbooks used within this course are written by leaders in the field of paleontology, including a text written by Dr. Steve Brusatte, who is one of the foremost experts of the field and a New York Times Bestseller author. Students will take a complete journey through the age of the dinosaurs by exploring topics such as the era of the dinosaurs, drifting continents, different dinosaur species and their biology, the end of an era, and how fossils are found and identified.

This basic science course offers an introduction to fundamental theories of modern astronomy. Gravity, laws of motion, stars, planets, galaxies, black holes, history of astronomy, and how the Earth was formed are discussed in introductory form.



**EDUC 711L** How the Weather Works**3 Semester Credits \$420.00**

This course brings weather alive with clearly explained texts supported by colorful illustrations and graphics. The course covers the history of weather, including critical scientific breakthroughs and the people who brought understanding to our climate's rich and varied 4.5-billion-year history.

**EDUC 711P** Mysteries of the Brain**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

On a journey through the brain, students will explore anatomy of the brain, including systems responsible for cognitive processes, basic neurophysiological functions, and current methods used to study brain-behavior relationships. Students will gain an understanding of how to apply this complex research for further comprehension of this information-rich subject.

**EDUC 712E** Bird Life and Behavior**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

Guided by an expert ornithologist's research, students will dive into the fascinating ways birds use their physical and behavioral traits to survive. Concepts covered include the feeding behaviors of birds, sensory abilities, migration and navigation, surviving extreme weather, bird communities, adapting to human influences, and much more. Discover why and how these unique creatures have been able to survive for more than 200 million years!

**EDUC 712H** Oceans**3 Semester Credits EBOOK OPTIONAL \$420.00**

This course introduces the student to oceanography and how the ocean works. The course covers the principles of marine biology and physical and chemical oceanography. How are the winds and currents driven? How does energy and carbon flow through marine trophic groups? What is the dilemma of the two-layered ocean? These and many other questions are explained in this marine science course.

This course is designed as a botanical/herbal and horticulture primer for the non-scientist. The course introduces students to basic botanical terminology, classification (how plants are named), evolution of major divisions and classes, and how to identify plants.

**EDUC 715E** Introduction to Invertebrate Zoology**3 Semester Credits** EBOOK OPTIONAL | PDF ONLY **\$420.00**

This course introduces the numerous invertebrate phyla and provides a description of the features that characterize each phylum, their diverse forms, functions, and evolutionary relationships. For those interested in biology, this course offers a lucid, yet comprehensive introduction, to a significant proportion of the diversity of life on Earth. A background in biology will be helpful for completing this course.

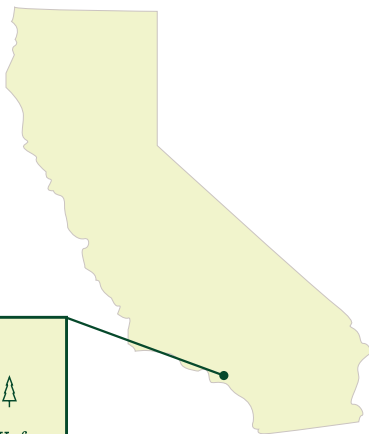
## **Can Professional Development Courses be used toward salary advancement?**
